The Granatkapelle chapel is firmly rooted in the white winter wonderland, widens towards the top and opens to the horizon before it retreats again and unites everything that is beautiful in itself. Heaven and earth seem to flow seamlessly into each other here.



ven the view from the Granatkapelle chapel down into Stillupptal is magical. All around, white giants pose proudly and impressively, competing for attention in their winter outfits. The sun makes the millions of white crystals covering them dance. Down on the valley floor, Stillupp reservoir glitters just as white or presents itself in elegant emerald green, depending on the temperature. A spectacle in itself and a motif of silent beauty.

But let's stick to the gems, because the Granatkapelle chapel does not owe its name to pure chance. One glance reveals everything: its architectural form resembles the polished Zillertal garnets - also known to many as the red carbuncles from the mythical and fairytale world of the Middle Ages. Embedded among the white mountains, the Granatkapelle chapel proudly towers on the sunny Penkenjoch plateau, showing us its contrasting side in earthy rust brown, especially now in winter. It is still in quiet hibernation. During the summer months, it opens its doors and invites all people, regardless of their religious beliefs, to pause and find peace.

The "Capella Granata" attracts us with its magnificent silhouette and graceful elegance in both summer and winter. It gives strength and on top of that rewards its visitors with fantastic panoramic views.









WINTERHIKINGPATH ON MOUNT PENKEN

Do you want to hear the snow crunching under your shoes? This beautiful winter hike is the perfect opportunity to experience just this and completely relax all at the same time! The tour starts at the Kombibahn Penken top station. It leads to the Penkenjoch, past the Granatkapelle chapel towering next to the reservoir pond, and back again. Enjoy spectacular views of the surrounding mountains during this leisurely hike.

Our tip: Before taking the Penkenbahn cable car back to the valley again, you can relax in a deckchair on the sun terrace at the top station and take a short journey through time with interesting insights into the history of skiing.



HOLIDAY REGION SPORTING DIVERSITY COME TOGETHER

Fügen-Kaltenbach. Situated right at the entrance to Zillertal, the first holiday region is the ultimate holiday region: first-class culinary delights, a wide range of activities for the whole family and sporting opportunities that will leave even passionate skiers breathless.

HOCHZILLERTAL-HOCHFÜGEN

Enjoyable break stops can be perfectly combined with sporty downhill turns. The stylish and cosy huts, together with the perfectly groomed slopes, provide an "allround carefree package" for all leisure skiers. In the Hochzillertal-Kaltenbach ski resort, early risers can already get on the gondola at 7.30 a.m. and enjoy the morning downhill runs on pristine slopes. Other highlights include the snow-covered valley runs and VIP gondola. If you like cool tricks and high jumps, Betterpark Hochzillertal is the place to be. The snow park is suitable for all skill levels with its XL kicker and chillout area. The high alpine winter via ferrata on the Wimbachkopf rewards climbers with a fantastic view.

Hochfügen has always been an insider tip among powder fans with its distinctive mountain formations. Special highlights include the Mindbender Canyon and speedline course. For ski tourers there are two marked climbing tracks and also tour Friday on the 8er-Alm. Thanks to the ideal altitude of the ski area, you can start earlier here. New: the RacePoint Hochfügen – professional race training from November.

Zell-Gerlos. Fun on the slopes, rustic huts, perfect sunny slopes, dreamy side valleys. Zell-Gerlos stands for all this and much more with the Zillertal Arena, the largest connected skiing area in Zillertal. Fun and action are guaranteed for the whole family on and off the slopes.

ZILLERTAL ARENA

From Zell am Ziller, Gerlos, Königsleiten, Wald and Krimml/Hochkrimml, the Zillertal Arena stretches from Tyrol's Zillertal valley to the Pinzgau region in the Salzburg federal state. Advanced skiers will get their money's worth here, as will freestylers in the fun parks and the youngest ski fans on the children's slopes and practice lifts.

For experienced winter sports enthusiasts: The Zell am Ziller valley run is one of the slopes with the greatest difference in altitude in Austria and truly lives up to its name as the "Height Devouring Tour". From the highest point at 2,500 metres above sea level you can cover almost 2,000 metres of altitude and ten kilometres of pistes in one go. The yellow mascot has a few surprises in store on the Funty slope at the Rosenalmbahn cable car, while Snowpark Gerlos, Funpark Hochkrimml, Actionpark Kreuzwiese and Shred School guarantee plenty of action. Fancy a trophy? Whoever masters the Arena Challenge and completes at least six of the 14 Champions stations in the form of SkiMovie runs, SpeedCheck runs and photo points will be named Arena Champion and receive their personal "Champions Movie".

Mayrhofen-Hippach. A holiday region with countless features. Snow-sure slopes and magical winter hiking trails meet culinary diversity and customs in Mountopolis, the Mayrhofner Bergbahnen adventure world with the Mount Ahorn and Mount Penken duo.

MOUNT PENKEN

The steepest slope experience in Zillertal awaits you on Mount Penken in the form of the Harakiri slope. With a gradient of 78%, ambitious skiers really need to pluck up a lot of courage to venture down this slope. However, the adrenaline rush is worth it and you'll remember it forever! PenkenPark demands no less courage and skills from freestylers. The Pro Area, Advanced Area, Medium Area, MediumJib Area, KidsPark and the new FunCross also promise a great time on the mountain for all skill levels. Anyone who still needs a bit of practice, is in good hands at KinderLand Horberg. With the 150er Tux cable car connection you can even get from Mount Penken to the Finkenberg, Rastkogel and Eggalm ski areas - where skiers' pulses really get racing. The fantastic panorama and magnificent view are the icing on the cake.

MOUNT AHORN

Families and leisure skiers will find their happiness here. In the early morning hours, before the sun even comes up, early risers can enjoy that magical first line in the snow with the EarlyBird on Mount Ahorn.

The downhill run down to the valley covers a whole 5.5 km and 1,400 metres in altitude on a black run. While the children improve their skiing skills together with Albert-Adler, you can rest in the White Lounge, and a ride on the Pisten-Bock provides a little adrenaline rush in between. One very special highlight for chilling out is the new Eagle's Stage Ahorn location right by the FalknerOase and in the middle of the Filzen reservoir pond. Here visitors can admire birds of prey in their winter aviaries. Kilometres of pistes: 13

Tux-Finkenberg. Tuxertal valley ranges from 850 to 3,250 metres above sea level and is one of the most snow-sure areas in Austria. The Tux-Finkenberg holiday region therefore stands for a winter wonderland covered in deep snow, romantic mountains and, of course, warm hospitality.

HINTERTUX GLACIER

The glacier ski area is one of the most impressive and diverse winter sports destinations in the Alps. Thanks to its glacier location, snow is guaranteed here from October until early summer, making it a popular destination for skiers, snowboarders, freeriders and professional athletes from all over the world. From wide carving slopes to challenging downhill runs and steep slopes covered in deep snow, you'll find everything your heart desires here. Betterpark Hintertux is a paradise for snowboarders and freeskiers from October to December and from April to June. It attracts professionals and beginners alike with perfectly shaped kickers, rails and pipes. But families and amateur sports enthusiasts can also expect a wide range of activities: Funslope, Kidsslope and the beautifully designed Flohpark offer the youngest guests playful skiing fun on the slopes, while there is also plenty to discover off-piste: Nature's Ice Palace, Spannagel cave or the panorama terrace at 3,250 metres including spectacular views. On the Schwarze Pfanne downhill run at the latest, it becomes clear what it means to carve through breathtaking alpine scenery complete with unforgettable panorama. Kilometres of pistes: 64



SKIING FUNCTION

548 kilometres of perfectly groomed pistes and 180 state-of-the-art lifts get skiers and snowboarders' pulses racing. Thanks to the altitude of the Zillertal ski resorts, reaching up to 3,250 meters above sea level, and the top piste and snow conditions that go hand in hand with this, skiing is possible here until well into April. Whether it's on wide panoramic pistes, magnificent family slopes or long, sporty downhill runs – all winter sports enthusiasts will find ideal conditions in Zillertal. All this guarantees a wonderful day of skiing – and with the Hintertux Glacier the longest ski season in Austria.

But there is also plenty of winter fun to be had off the slopes. Whether it's in the sunshine or under the stars: 15 toboggan

runs with a total length of 48 kilometres, 28 of which are floodlit at night, provide plenty of variety. Pure thrills are to be had with snowtubing. Or you can even whizz down the slope on a PistenBock.

Snow crystals glisten in the air and deep snow crunches under your shoes. Whether it's winter hiking on groomed theme trails or snowshoe hikes to remote locations, you can explore picturesque paths and enjoy the tranquillity and beauty of nature.

IKING



Playful or sporty, romantically for two or cheerfully with the children: you can skate your laps or show off elegant pirouettes on a total of ten ice rinks. Looking for another challenge on the ice rink? Then a sociable round of ice stock sport is the right thing for you.

Experience nature and enjoy captivating silence. Be it skating or classic cross-country skiing, beginner or advanced, on the valley floor or on the high-altitude trail: 113 kilometres of cross-country ski trails set the stage for a spectacular experience in Zillertal.





THESE SLOPES ARE RIFE WITH

STORIES

The curious, sometimes funny names of the slopes and lifts are bound to not escape the attention of vigilant skiers. They make us smile and sometimes wonder.

total of 548 kilometres of pistes in the Zillertal ski resorts get winter sports fans' pulses racing. The slopes are divided into the difficulty levels blue (easy), red (moderately difficult) and black (difficult). Most of the slopes are named and numbered very pragmatically. Anyone who has ever listened attentively to their neighbours on the chairlift or in the cable car is familiar with these kinds of or similar conversations: "First we'll do the red number seven, later we'll meet at the intersection of the blue number five and the black number eight."

But every now and then it's worth listening more carefully, because there are some interesting and amusing stories behind several

unusual slope names. Sometimes the names stem from the Zillertal dialect and old field names. Other names are more of an indication of the up-

coming test of courage or technical challenge. On the following pages we set out on a quest to find what is hiding behind those names!

"From the treasure trove: field names, stories and dialect."

AT THE WILDE KRIMML AND IN TEUFELTAL

We are in the middle of the Zillertal Arena. The ski area's size and variety are really a marvel to behold. "Isn't this beautiful?", the man opposite seems to be able to read my mind. We're sitting in the new "Wilde Krimml" 10-person gondola, which is taking us from Zell am Ziller to Gerlos in comfort. He accepts the nod of my head and bright As we continue to chat, he tells eyes as agreement and continues: "The mountain pastures up here are among the oldest in Tyrol. Innerertens - that's what they're called and they got their name from the Celts a long time ago." I'm curious to learn more as I have someone know why this gondola lift is called Wilde Krimml. "That's easy to answer. Down there is Krummbachtal valley, which literally translates to "crooked stream valley".

Krimml means pretty much the same as Krumm, crooked, and because the stream is so wild and crooked as it winds its way out of the valley, it ended up with the name: Wilde Krimml," explains the friendly man. By the way, his name is David Kammerlander and he has been working for the Zillertal Arena for more than 30 years.

another exciting fact: "The Wilde Krimml continues into Teufeltal, meaning "devil's valley", with its inaccessible, rugged and winding gorge. Only the devil can live in such a place - or so the locals say. In any case, at the end of the valley sitting next to me who is bound to is the new Teufeltalbahn, an 8person chairlift with weather covers and heated seats, completing the modern link from Zell to Gerlos in first-class style.

IN THE NAME OF THE WINNER

The Hochzillertal-Kaltenbach ski resort is widely known for its sophisticated, culinary options. But there is a second celebrity in the region, to whom an entire slope has been dedicated - the snow-covered run down to the valley in Kaltenbach. You probably already know who we're talking about: a very talented skier whose willpower led to extraordinary success. We're talking about none other than the Olympic champion, triple world champion, double overall World Cup winner and gold medallist of 29 World Cup races - Stephan Eberharter.

The famous alpine skier grew up in Stumm and became a big name in the Hochzillertal ski resort. Even though he hasn't skied in a World Cup race for a long time, he can still be spotted, with a bit of luck, carving down the eight-kilometre-long Stephan Eberharter Gold slope.

TAKE THE PLUNGE

Admittedly, you need a bit of courage as well as skill if you want to whizz down the black slopes. And so the slope name "Obitraudi" encouragingly stands for the sporty, challenging run number four in the Hochfügen ski resort. Now you might be wondering what "Obi-

traudi" actually means? Well, it stands for that renowned first impression when you're standing at the start of a black slope. When you quickly realise that you have to dare and take the plunge. In the Zillertal dialect, you would say "obi trauen". "Obi trau di" means something like "take the plunge". You will be rewarded with the fantastic view of the snowy Zillertal Alps in any

BLACK ACTION ON MOUNT PENKEN

A proper adrenaline rush is also guaranteed in the Mayrhofen ski resort, where a number of black slopes demand expert skiing skills. First and foremost and hard for anyone to miss – the legendary Harakiri run. With a 78 per cent gradient, it is the steepest slope experience in Austria and is considered the ultimate test of courage, which should of course go hand in hand with the necessary talent. Because otherwise you might shoot downhill faster than intended.

It is therefore recommended to warm up on the two other black slopes in the ski resort, or use them to assess your ability, as they are slightly less steep than the Harakiri slope, but are still not to be underestimated. As for the Harakiri run, so here does the name say it all.

The BlackAttack, also known as black run number 16, by the Möslbahn cable car is pretty fast. As a special highlight, you can analyse your own turns by video along the SkiMovie run and measure your time from start to finish. You can challenge yourself to attack and beat your personal record again and again. Devil's Run, ski slope number 12, runs under the Schneekar lift and is demanding on the hamstrings and concentration. The steep slope is like a ride with the devil. Anyone who manages this, is ready for the Harakiri.

HAXENBRECHER

For many people, skiing is synonymous with joy and unwinding. This is especially true when freeriding fun can really be enjoyed to the full in perfect ease. A real insider tip is ski route 13a on the Hintertux Glacier, which goes up to 3,250 metres. A fact that more or less provides guarantee of snow. Whether it's in November or April – freeriders enjoy half a year of powder snow, firn and snow crust. In warmer temperatures, the snow can sometimes turn slushy. When that happens, those practicing winter sports out there must be

careful, as you can break your legs in difficult snow. Hence the appropriate name for ski route 13a: Haxenbrecher, or leg breaker for English speakers.

OF CATS, LAMBS AND RABBITS

Before your image of the slopes and their names becomes too spectacular, let's come back down to earth, because most names are inspired by their location, i.e. the alpine pastures and field names. Nevertheless, these names also sometimes sound funny. And so chroniclers, foresters and farmers tell tales about the ori-

gin of the names Katzenmoos, Lämmerbichl and Hasenmulde in the Eggalm, Rastkogel and Finkenberg ski areas. "Subject to interpretation, though," they say, because only their fore-fore-bearers know the real reasons for the names: "The area where the Katzenmoos (cats' moss) lift runs is very mossy. Because of the moisture, many mice are easy prey for the cats there. The Lämmerbichl (lambs' hill) are where the farmers' sheep go during the summer months. The high concentration of wild hares sighted gave the Hasenmulde (hares' hollow) its name."

MASCOTS ON A SKI SAFARI!

The fun slopes for children and ski beginners are named after the Zillertal ski resorts' mascots: Knappi, FUNty, AlbertAdler and Luis, the glacier flea. They are united by the irrepressible fun of skiing.

In the Spieljoch family ski area we meet Knappi along Mount Ahorn ski resort is considered a true family the Funslope and in the Funpark. Always with a smile on his face, he motivates children and ski beginners, gives them tips and also likes to play in the snow. FUNty the yellow elephant accompanies you throughout the Zillertal Arena ski area, but especially along the FUNty the middle station in Zell. With a bit of luck, you'll also see FUNty live at numerous events.

paradise with its mascot Albert Adler. You will encounter the friendly companion in many versions along the AlbertAdler Tour, at the FunRide Ahorn or in the AlbertAdler PlayWorld. Luis the glacier flea lives on Hintertux Glacier. He loves teaching children to ski on slope from the Rosenalmbahn cable car top station to the Kidsslope and Funslope. Even learning the safety rules is fun with him.

When the ski season starts, the valley becomes a snow-covered venue for sporting, cultural and culinary events that will enchant all your senses.

KRAMPUS RUNS

This traditional custom takes place every year in December. Masked Krampus figures, accompanied by St. Nicholas, parade through the streets to ward off evil and welcome winter. An unforgettable experience!

SKI FOOD FESTIVAL

The Hochzillertal-Kaltenbach ski region and Spieljoch ski resort in Fügen invite you to a culinary opening in mid-December. During the two-day event, winter sports enthusiasts get to taste special delicacies from different corners of the world. And culinary delights await you in between at the lift stations.

ADVENT MARKETS

Advent is a time full of contemplative anticipation. The idyllic villages shine in Christmas splendour, while lovingly decorated stalls with festive music, regional handicraft products and delicious treats await at the Advent markets in Fügen, Zell, Mayrhofen and Tux.

MAURACHER & MOHR




is heart is racing. His hands in the thick gloves are shaking. One last deep breath, then Rico picks up speed with his board and heads for the kicker, an imposing ski jump made of snow. Seconds full of tension: Will the trick be a success? Will he manage the landing? And how will the Ästhetiker boardriding jury rate the jump? Then the utter cry of joy. And everyone agrees: This is something you only experience at the legendary Välley Rälley!

YOUNG TALENT IN A COMPETITIVE FRENZY

Under the leadership of the "Die Ästhetiker" snow-board club, Zillertal transforms into an impressive show stage for young snowboarding talent on four weekends between December and April. At each contest, a total of 100 participants from all over Europe compete in "slopestyle" and take the opportunity to work on new tricks under the guidance of real professionals. It's not surprising that many of today's World Cup or Youth Olympic champions won their first gold medal at the Välley Rälley.

"Over the last 12 years, the tour has developed into one of the most important European snowboarding events for young talent. The youngest participants are aged 5, the oldest about 25 years old," explains Rudi Kröll from Die Ästhetiker.

The Zillertal snow parks are known for their versatility and offer snowboarders of all ages and skill levels countless possibilities to work on new tricks.



FUN IS ALWAYS THE TOP PRIORITY

A major incentive to participate in the Välley Rälley is undoubtedly the connection to the "World Snowboard Point List" and the "World Rookie Ranking". At each tour stop, the young snowboarders earn points to qualify for international competitions and can even secure a ticket to the Olympics.

But just as important as the sporting challenge are the passion and pure joy of snowboarding that can be felt every day at the Välley Rälley. You stand together at the edge of the piste, cheering, clapping and experiencing every run as a shared highlight. Organisers, participants, families and coaches form a warm, family-like community in which friendships are made across all national borders.

UNIQUE: FOUR STOPS IN FOUR REGIONS

Each of the four tour weekends takes place in a different part of Zillertal. The snow parks in the ski resorts are turned into the perfect stage for this. The Saturdays are all about coaching: Die Ästhetiker live for passing on their skills to the next generation and are also happy to help newcomers with the first freestyle attempts. Sunday is then contest day. The tension is in the air. After all, everyone has only two runs to present their best tricks in perfect order and execution.







The performance is assessed by the judges, who award points according to certain criteria. All this full-on action happens in eight categories and four different age groups for 100 participants in total.













At the age of five, Ben is the youngest participant. Full of concentration, he learns quite a few tricks by watching his older role models.

The judges come from the ranks of the Die Ästhetiker snowboard club – one of the first boardriding crews in the world to emerge in the early 1990s. The all have a career as professional snowboarders behind them and hold high-calibre qualifications as coaches and judges.

While the children and teenagers reach deep into their box of tricks, the judges discuss the performances, sympathising when someone doesn't "stomp" a trick. Each snowboarder's final score is then recorded. At the end of each day of the contest, the winners are selected and celebrated in four age groups:

Under 12s – Super Groms Boys & Girls 13-15 years old – Groms Boys & Girls 16-17 years old – Rookie Boys & Girls From 18 years old – Open Class Women & Men

1ST TOUR STOP: BETTERPARK HOCHZILLERTAL

The snow park in the Hochzillertal-Kaltenbach ski region is 320 m long in total and offers various areas for all skill levels. You can choose from beginner line, medium line, pro line and jib line. The highlight is the XL kicker, which invites you to "shoot", offering the audience in the chill-out area a great show.

2ND TOUR STOP: ACTION-PARK KREUZWIESE

A snow park with a focus on families awaits you in the Zillertal Arena. The moderate jumps and simple obstacles are arranged harmoniously in a beginner and medium line. Good to know: every Tuesday the Ästhetiker Shred School offers freestyle coaching for beginners and advanced boarders free of charge.

3RD TOUR STOP: PENKENPARK MAYRHOFEN

The Ästhetiker crew's home park is considered one of the five best snow parks in Europe and impresses with an advanced and pro line in addition to its beginner, easy and medium line. There are also numerous obstacles in all levels of difficulty and a lot of professional boardriders who train here all winter.

4TH TOUR STOP: BETTERPARK HINTERTUX

On Hintertux Glacier at 3,200 m above sea level, is Austria's highest freestyle spot with the best guarantee of snow. The snow park is one of the best in the Alpine region and is THE place to be, especially in autumn and spring. A jib line, various jump lines and a massive pro jump provide adrenaline and plenty of variety.







ountless songs and poems give homage to spring, which stands for the pure power of life. Flora and fauna find new vigour, and we humans are also occasionally led by our endorphins. The true story of young Simon Wildauer tells us how much one of the most isolated side valleys in Zillertal can contribute to new beginnings. At the end of the 1960s, the son of a wealthy large-scale farmer escaped the pressure and expectations he felt, opting to live in the Märzengrund side valley instead. He was drawn well above the tree line and found what he had been missing in the valley for over 40 years: freedom.

The story of the hermit inspired an impressive theatre piece by Felix Mitterer, which was made into a film in 2020. Whether it's on the silver screen or in reality, the characters of Simon and the Märzengrund are similar: not very approachable and mysterious. But to the eyes a picturesque play of natural forces in any case. And a prime example of the energy that can be released when you listen to your heart and remain true to yourself. If you visit the Märzengrund, you will probably also feel its magic and the power of this special side valley.

Important: In spring, snow can sometimes still be found at higher altitudes. Before you set off on your hike, inform yourself about the conditions and adapt your tour if necessary.









HIKE TO THE MÄRZENGRUND SIDE VALLEY

Gasthof Almluft is the starting point for this hike, which is a perfect mixture of traditional alpine scenery and impressive mountains. The hiking trail leads to the Hochstadlalm, through the forest and across alpine meadows to the Forsthaus Gmünd foresters' lodge and on to the Gmünder Alm. You hike leisurely along the rushing Märzenbach stream to the mysterious Gmünder valley basin. Tranquillity, the sound of streams and the vast view of the surrounding mountain peaks dominate here.



or days, the anticipation has been barely containable: "Mum, Mum – have they finally been born?" We find out through social media that there are soon going to be some baby goats at Erlebnissennerei Zillertal. Since then, the children can hardly wait to visit the young, furry little kids. When the happy message of the new arrivals reaches us by ringtone, the afternoon activity is set in stone: we're taking the most direct route to Mayrhofen – to the show farm.

ON ANIMAL TRAILS

With the tickets in our hands, we approach the goat shed at what feels like breakneck speed. But hang on, what now?! The children suddenly stop. Oh, how sweet —I see! Fortunately, they are still finely tuned to sensing the extraordinary. It's not just the goats who've had offspring — but the pigs too. In the realm of the Pietrain pigs Fredy, Pixi, Frieda and Rudi, little piglets are on a foraging expedition in search of worms, beetles and roots. Time and again they tumble around, play with each other and then crawl back under Mum's belly. As we stand and watch them, we almost forget why we're here when a loud "baaa" reminds us. "The goats are already calling us," the children agree and walk past the farmhouse, natural pond and chicken coop, over to the goat shed.

And then they stand still. In silence as if they were in the presence of the Pope, Emperor or another dazzlingly important person, and watch the little kids play. They jump and eat, cuddle and sniff – just as if they'd already been on this Earth a long time. But this sweet moment ends abruptly: Two goats jump up and look at us curiously, as if they just want to ask: "Food or petting?" We laugh out loud and discover that the children can climb over ladders into the shed. What a joy. Now all the kids are united – mine and the nanny goat's.

SO MUCH TO DISCOVER

After extensive stroking and feeding, we say goodbye to the funny four-legged friends and do the same as the goats: we go on a journey of discovery and learn many interesting facts. Did you know, for example, that goldfish come from the carp family, pigs like to play ball, a bee has more hair than a goat, cows are pretty smart and an old cherry tree can carry up to a million blossoms at a time? We have great fun strolling through the show farm, from the pasture milk shed, over the pigsty to the fish pond and the organic chickens, on to the bee pavilion with a show bee hive, the herb beds and the adventure area with hay stall, climbing wall, tractor course, pasture milk slide and photo point.

It blossoms in stunning splendour. And baaas in tireless playfulness. It goes up and down, back and forth. Whether it's humans or animals – we love the awakening of nature. Spring is here.

Fortunately, we can refresh ourselves here with fresh spring water from the fountain – wonderful! And then, like a stroke of good fortune, we rediscover our favourites: 20 cheeky young goats in the goat kindergarten. We enter their area through a special entrance and spend another half an hour feeding and petting them.

AMAZEMENT AND INDULGENCE

"Now it's our turn. We're hungry." I certainly would have been surprised if this sentence hadn't come up. And so we follow our nose and enter the "Sennereiküche" – the restaurant at Erlebnissennerei Zillertal. "Today, there's cheesecakes, apple strudel or chocolate brownies," I read from the daily menu and it doesn't take long for the children's milk-bearded faces to look totally satisfied. As naturally they wanted to drink a glass of milk with their sweet treats.








Apricot, strawberry, coffee, wild blueberry, ... with such a large selection of yoghurt varieties, choosing your favourite is not easy.

ALL OF A

FLUTTER


But instead of being armed with binoculars and rifles,

Because what they are hunting for is, in fact, butterflies.

he gravel crunches under the tyres as the car stops at the end of the steep path. Today there's a new moon, the night will get so dark that you can hardly see your hand in front of your eyes. Ideal conditions to attract as many different butterflies, silkworm moths and hawk moths as possible. Biologist Kurt Lechner loads the equipment from the boot and sets up the light trap with well-practiced ease: six-foot white canvas screens are stretched into a kind of sail, a special light bulb hangs directly in front of this construction and is the only light source far and wide – an irresistible attraction for all kinds of nocturnal butterflies. And there are more of them here, high up in the Zillertal Alps, than you might think.

"It is said that the flapping of a butterfly's wings can cause a tornado at the other end of the world," the biologist smirks. "But butterflies have a much more concrete significance for our research: They are an ideal indicator of how intact nature is in a given area." We learn that every species of butterfly is dependent on very specific plants, flowers, fungi or even animals in its habitat. So lots of butterflies are a natural indicator of an intact ecosystem and the properly functioning interplay of all living things in our mountains.

COLOURFUL BLOOMING PARADISE

Kurt Lechner and Alois Ortner's "hunting ground" is located above Brandberg, in the middle of the Nature Park Zillertal Alps. It covers an area of 422 square kilometres, which is about 40% of the entire Zillertal, and extends over all altitude levels of the Alps - a true Garden of Eden for rare animal and plant species.

Mountain meadows still exist up here: remote, often ex tremely steep meadows, which have once a year at most and only with a scythe for hundreds of years. tacular appearance. The colours of

These mountain meadows, which are important for hay, bloom with teeming life. Thousands of colourful flowers and fragrant herbs create the conditions for real biodiversity hotspots and are home to an incredible variety of very special animal and plant species - including very rare butterflies.

As the night progresses, more and more butterflies are attracted to the light. "A great tiger moth!", exclaims Alois Ortner with delight. With its orange and red hind wings and a wingspan of up to 6.5 cm, it boasts a particularly striking and spec-

this moth are there as a warning for predators, as if to say: "Don't eat me, I'm poisonous!" During the day, the moth sits motionless on trees and is perfectly camouflaged. The colourful undersides of the wings are not visible, but when a predator approaches – for example, a tit – the great tiger moth shows the bird its red hind wings in a flash and the tit flies away in terror.

Biologists Kurt Lechner and Alois Ortner know the butterflies and moths of the Alps better than almost anyone else. They both discovered their passion for the fluttering insects during their schooldays, and this passion strengthened into a true calling

during their university studies. For three years, the researchers recorded all the butterfly species found on Alpine mountain meadows and were able to identify 69 different butterflies and Zygaenidae moths on an area smaller than a football pitch, which is 40% of all species known in Tyrol. Since the start of 2024, it's been the moths' turn.

FASCINATING RELATIONSHIPS

The complex and at the same time fascinating interplay and relationships between different species is shown by the example of the large blue butter-

fly. The large blue female lays her eggs between the flowers of wild thyme, no other plant would do. A small caterpillar emerges from the egg, drops to the ground and waits for its taxi - an ant.

> The large blue is a prime example of the remarkable relationship between different species.

The caterpillar mimics the pheromones of the ant, so it takes what it thinks is an ant back to its nest, where the caterpillar can be cared for and fed by the ants. Still chemically disguised, the caterpillar finally pupates in the anthill. The tricky part for the large blue starts when it hatches from its cocoon and its pheromone camouflage is exposed. The freshly hatched butterfly must flee before the ants can expose it as an intruder and attack.

This interplay between special species forms our finely balanced ecosystem. Changes in these systems can therefore be interpreted as environmental indicators. When a species' stock increases or decreases, this indicates a shift in balance.

BASIS OF LIFE

"Life on Earth as we know it would not be possible at all without insects," explains Willi Seifert, head of the Nature Park. "Of the approximately 1.8 million different species on our planet, around half are insects."

Many of the services provided free of charge by nature—such as pollination or soil formation, access to water and food, air purification or protection against erosion—would be unthinkable without insects.






he journey is the goal. Definitely, we fully agree with this old adage. As along the paths to the summit cross we discover the great variety of flora and fauna in Zillertal's mountains. Magnificent alpine roses, clear mountain lakes, impressive birds and all kinds of animals crawling underfoot can be spotted on the way to the Isskogel. But if we're really honest, the summit and entering our name in the summit book are in fact our favourite goal.

The motivation for this are the emotions that flood our minds and hearts when we're standing at the summit cross. Quite logically in fact, as the reward after the major exertion over the many metres of elevation is absolutely stunning: we can't get enough of the beauty of the panorama. Our gaze wanders into infinity, way beyond the surrounding peaks. And everything that seemed so big down there is suddenly very small. We draw strength from that moment on the mountain.

Zillertal's mountains offer us an almost inexhaustible range of hiking and biking routes. So all we have to do is set off, make the most of the day and conquer mountains such as the 2,263-metre-high Isskogel. The wooden summit cross invites us to pause on the small plateau and enjoy the magnificent panoramic view from the little bench. **Our tip:** You can also reach the summit of the Isskogel by mountain bike.










KING'S TOUR TO THE ISSKOGEL

This challenging mountain bike tour starts in Gerlos. Taking the forest road you reach the Gerlostalalm through shady forest sections and then continue on to the Innerertensalm, biking in scenic winding bends up to the Isskogel summit cross. The strenuous ascent is rewarded with a fantastic view of the Zillertal Alps. The varied descent leads down to the Latschenalm and the Isskogelbahn cable car top station. **Tip:** The Isskogelbahn cable car is a great option for those who don't have quite





as much stamina! You can cover the elevation gain in comfort

and still enjoy the unforgettable view from the summit.




Hiking in the summer mountain scenery is fascinating and fulfilling at the same time, but there are also experiences beyond this.

Be inspired and let us show you the mysterious places of power in Zillertal.

ong before breakfast we are wide awake and also a little bit excited. Swimming in rockpools is on the agenda today. Together in a small group of like-minded people we follow Pia on a narrow path through dense forest. She is our guide and is taking us to one of her favourite secret spots: to fantastic natural pools in the middle of an imposing rock gorge. These "Gumpen" are natural pools formed by the crystal clear streams in their river beds, which also invite you to swim in summer.

THE PEACE AND POWER OF WATER

The partly moss-covered and stony path between rocks and trees is hardly recognisable to us. But Pia knows exactly where to go, and while she steers us purposefully to the site, she tells us about her work as a hiking guide: "Being healthy and happy is the best thing you can strive for. That's why I've made it my mission to help people find inner peace." She likes to share her knowledge and passion on guided tours through Zillertal's nature and mountains – just as she is doing with us today. Water, Pia tells us, often plays a significant role in the choice of her destinations. The cool water, in crystal clear mountain lakes or flowing waters, provides instant relaxation in seconds and a real fresh boost.



When the warm summer sun conquers the sky and the fresh mountain air fills our lungs, a feeling of peace and lightness awakens in us.

Inhale, exhale, listen to the spring water rippling. Immerse yourself and experience the whole diversity of the valley - from the rugged Alpine peaks to the small flowers on the side of the trail. Filled with euphoria, Pia tells us what else she has in her programme: "I know some very special spots that are ideal for yoga and Pilates up the mountain: at the top of a mountain, on the shore of a mountain lake or on scenic sunny plateaus. For my meditation walks I like to find paths to or along the numerous impressive waterfalls. The power of water simply radiates a special peace and calm."

WATER AS A STAGE FOR EXPERIENCES

The element of water, we learn, stands for purity and clarity with its powerful yin energy. It symbolises permanently flowing life. But it can also be associated with adrenaline. It is hard to imagine that calm Pia is also a real action professional. As part of an experienced and well-trained team, she accompanies water sports activities such as canyoning, rafting, tubing and riverbug as well as other adventurous experiences. Zillertal offers spectacular locations for this with the Ziller river, numerous tributaries and remote side valleys.

THE FASCINATION OF ETERNAL ICE

"One thing, however, that always amazes my guests is the experience of 'snow and ice in summer'," Pia smiles. After all, there are around 75 glaciers in Zillertal, whose peaks are often covered with snow all year round. One special place to experience this first-hand is Hintertux Glacier. "It's an incredible feeling when you get on the gondola in summer temperatures and suddenly find yourself in a winter landscape at the top station at 3,250 m." The right preparation and equipment are important here: warm clothing and good footwear. But ice cannot only be found on the glacier all year round. "There are even mountain lakes in higher elevations, which are not even clear of ice in summer in some years," Pia reports.

MAGICAL MOMENTS BETWEEN DAY AND NIGHT

When Pia talks about the sunrise tour she has planned for the next day, we listen fascinated: "You will remember a sunrise on the mountain your whole life. After climbing up in the dark, the horizon begins to glow in soft pink and orange. The night slowly gives way to the dim light of dawn, and you can already see the contours of the surrounding peaks. The world is waking up and the cool air feels invigorating. When the sun finally pushes over the ridges, the landscape is bathed in a golden light.


The summits of the Zillertal Alps shine in warm colours. It is a moment of incredible beauty and peace."

The experience during a sunset walk is similar and yet very different. Of course, Pia also has this in her repertoire. But it's not just the change between day and night that's magical, the changing seasons are too. Of course, not all activities can be enjoyed at any time of the year, so it is important to inform yourself well about the weather and temperatures. The safest and most relaxed way is to be accompanied by an experienced guide, so you can fully concentrate on the experience and you will even get to the most tucked away secret spots.

AT THE DESTINATION OF DREAMS

We have now arrived at the crystal clear rockpool and take time for a brief introduction to the Wim-Hof method for breathing meditation. This is based on three pillars: breathing technique, cold therapy and meditation. Under Pia's guidance, we perform this special breathing technique, which is about optimising the oxygen supply and improving body awareness. It is intended to promote health, strengthen the immune system and increase energy levels.

After having meditated together, we sense a pleasant tingling and a feeling of energy and alertness, but at the same time deep relaxation and inner peace.







Now it's time to get into the rockpool's ice-cold water. Despite the low water temperature, we manage to overcome our inhibition and embrace the cold. Very mindfully. The feeling is indescribable. Afterwards, Pia has a small warm-up and a hot cup of tea prepared.

Filled with feelings of happiness, we head back to our hotel to indulge in breakfast rested and refreshed. But in my mind, we're already on tomorrow's sunrise tour with Pia. Because we definitely don't want to miss that.

he early worm lured us out of bed at dawn. Or to put it better – little Lieselotte. She's been looking forward to the Zillertal farmers' market for days. The shopping basket is ready to grab quickly and if we didn't know the way to the marketplace, our senses would get us there. Our eyes, ears and nose are working overtime. There is so much to see, hear and smell that they're struggling to decide where to take us. This mixture of music, voices, fragrances and good spirits – so wonderful. The industrious market traders stand proudly behind their stalls and present their products from local agriculture and in-house production.

REGIONAL PRODUCTS

First of all, we decide to get a lay of the land – the range of regional products is so vast. And so we immediately check out the wide variety of freshly harvested fruits, herbs and vegetables. We learn how carefully they have been grown and harvested in lively conversations and even exchange recipes. "For apple strudel it's best to use Braeburn, Boskop or Elstar apples," the lady behind the stall tells us, putting a kilogramme of Boskop apples into the paper bag. "We picked these fresh this morning," she says, handing them over and wishing us good luck with our baking.

Regional and seasonal: we find vegetables, fruits, herbs, microgreens, and even fertilisers and seeds in abundance at the market stalls.

We can't get enough of the wide range of specialities and unique items. Fortunately, the market traders advise us with their expertise

At other market stalls, we can see in just how many different ways the harvested delicacies can be refined and processed: jams, juices, jellies, chutneys, pasta, herbal salts, schnapps and liqueurs represent the wealth of ideas from market traders. The love put into this work can be clearly seen from the hand-labelled jars and bottles.

How much time and expertise has been put into each individual product can only be guessed at, because the producers rarely clock in and out. "After all, it's the result that counts," we learn - and the result is delicious. And so we sample our way through the regional delicacies: freshly baked bread, homemade butter, alpine cheese, bacon, sausages, smoked fish and much more. "If you enjoyed it, you can visit us at our farm shop," smiles the farmer, handing us her business card. A great idea, because the freshly baked bread will soon be polished off.

In addition to the many delicacies, the market also offers a lovely selection of handicrafts. Sewing work,

tastefully crafted decorations, jewellery and many other unique creative pieces can be found at the stalls. Here, too, we can immediately see how proud the sellers are, because the artists themselves are usually standing at the market stall, touting their works. New commissioned works are continuously created during the market day, because unique pieces express a special form of appreciation

towards the artist and the recipient. The relaxed atmosphere unites gourmets and lovers of authentic, regional products.

TREAT ALL YOUR SENSES

At the benches and tables we sit down and listen to the young musicians, who add harmonious sounds to the beautiful feeling of togetherness. In typical spirited Zillertal style, they play their repertoire and encourage others to sing along - just like their great role models. A nice man also comes up and asks if we'd like some food and drink. "Today we have 'Kiachl'," we learn and order the Zillertal delicacy - first with sauerkraut and later again with cranberry jam, because that's Lieselotte's favourite. A shopping spree like this certainly makes you hungry. And so we let it end indulgently - in a great mood and with regional delicacies.

AUTUMN IS A TIME TO INDULGE

Feasts and enjoyment are particularly celebrated during the golden season in Zillertal. There are many reasons for this. First and foremost, the gratitude for a beautiful summer farming period, the associated cattle drive and the joy of a rich harvest, which is processed, distilled and cooked in a variety of ways.

The fruits of the harvest are enjoyed with family and dear friends with stories being told around the table and one or two musicians taking out their instruments. And thus with singing and celebrating to their heart's content.

FRUITY SWEET AND SAVOURY AT THE SAME TIME:

STUFFED POTATO FRITTERS

INGREDIENTS

Dough:

- · 600 g floury potatoes (cooked the day before)
- · 150 g medium fine flour
- · 1 egg, 1 egg yolk
- · ½ tsp salt, a pinch of nutmeg

Filling:

· Cranberries in a jar

For frying:

- · 1 egg white
- · Smooth flour
- · Concentrated butter

PREPARATION

Peel and finely grate the potatoes or use a potato ricer. Add the eggs, flour and spices and mix into a smooth dough using your hands. Cover the mixture for 60 minutes and leave to rest at room temperature.

Roll out the dough on a floured work surface into about 3 mm thin and 5 cm wide sheets.

Place a teaspoon of cranberries on the sheet of dough at regular intervals, brush around it with egg white, place another sheet on top and press gently. Cut out 4 x 4 cm fritters using a knife or pastry wheel. Place the dough pieces on a floured surface.

Heat the concentrated butter in a large, deep pan until it smokes slightly. Fry the potato fritters in portions (turn as soon as they start to bubble)

INGREDIENTS

Dough:

- · 250 g plain wheat flour
- · 250 g rye flour
- · 1 tsp salt
- · Approx. 200 ml "milky water" (half water, half milk)

Filling:

- · 1 kg potatoes
- · 100 g Tyrolean grey cheese
- · 125 g curd cheese
- · 1 bunch chives
- · 1 tsp salt

For frying:

- · Smooth flour
- · Concentrated butter

PREPARATION

Mix the flour with the salt, gradually add the liquid and knead into a smooth dough. Leave it to rest covered.

In the meantime, boil the potatoes until soft, peel and mash them or use a potato ricer.

Chop the chives into thin rings. Crumble the cheese and mix it thoroughly with the salt, chives, curd cheese and potatoes.

Form the dough into a 5 cm thick roll for the Krapfen. Cut about 2 cm wide strips from the roll, form a ball, press it flat and roll it out into a thin round sheet on a floured worktop using a rolling pin. Cover with a kitchen towel until ready to continue.

Fill each of the sheets with one tbsp of the potato mixture, fold over and press together firmly (if the dough is dry and/or does not stick together, wet the sheets on the inside with a little (!) water).

Heat the concentrated butter in a large, deep pan (until it smokes slightly) and fry the Krapfen in small portions for a short time (turn once the underside is brown).

Serve the Krapfen with sour cream.

TIP: Rolling out the sheets is the toughest manual work. Instead, roll out thin sheets using a pasta machine and cut out circles with a diameter of about 12 cm on a well-floured work surface.

BREAD PUDDING IN A GLASS







4 servings

Takes approx. 60 minutes

Easy

INGREDIENTS

- Yeast pastries (may also be old and dry)
- · 3 eggs
- · 300 ml single cream
- · 1 tbsp honey
- · Juice of ½ lemon
- · 1 tbsp sugar

Filling:

- · 3 sour apples
- · Juice of 1/2 lemon
- · 1 tbsp sugar
- · 1 tbsp cinnamon

For assembly:

- · Four 200 ml glasses
- · Some butter
- · Icing sugar

PREPARATION

Cut the pastries into about 5 mm thin slices.

Separate the eggs. Mix the egg yolks thoroughly with the single cream and honey.

Peel the apples, remove the core, dice the apples into small cubes and mix with the lemon juice, sugar and cinnamon.


Whisk the egg white with the lemon juice and sugar until stiff

Coat the glasses with a bit of butter. Fill the glasses with alternating layers of pastry slices and apples, finish with a yeast pastry layer one finger width under the rim of the glass.

Carefully pour the cream into the glasses until the contents are covered.

Place the whipped egg white on top of the glasses and bake the Scheiterhaufen at 180 $^{\circ}$ C for 15-18 minutes with the fan on.






he hoarfrost has not yet dried, the temporary footprints leave a line of dashes along the Loschbodenalm and the imposing peaks of the Tux main ridge hide behind the veil of autumn fog. But with every ray of sunshine that passes through the white pillows, it gets lighter. And in the next moment, the golden season lives up to its name. Autumn is often described as a period of change. The shorter days prepare us for winter, reducing some daily activities.

But it is in fact now that it's particularly worth taking a closer look watching nature retreat and come to rest. And so it will not escape attentive hikers that the ants are retreating into deeper nest layers and closing their entrances. Marmots are looking for the last fresh shoots before rolling into their dens to hibernate. There's also lots happening along the roughly one kilometre long dry stone wall, which runs "Am Flach" along the border to the Elsalm. A large number of insects, spiders, even mountain newts, are preparing themselves carefully for hibernation in order to start again with fresh energy in spring. From time to time we also like to retreat. By contemplating and grounding ourselves, we draw strength in the autumnal mountains.

Important: The autumn season sometimes comes with surprises and there may already be snow at higher altitudes. Before you set off, inform yourself about the conditions and adapt your tour if necessary.









AT THE FOOT OF THE TUX MAIN RIDGE

Whether it's trekking, trail running or biking & hiking: the landscape around the Loschbodenalm not only promises variety, it also offers wonderful stops for refreshments. The hike starts at the entrance of Juns and leads along a forest path slightly uphill towards Grieralm. Passing the Grierer Lacke you reach the Höllensteinhütte with some steeper passages over the Tappeneck. From there, the old hiking trail through the forest

leads back to the valley. **Tip:** For those with more stamina, a detour to the Tettensjoch is certainly worth the additional 6.6 km and 560 metres in altitude. You need about 1 hr 45 minutes walking time for the climb up.





HEAD TO THE COLOURFUL

ALPINE AUTUMN

Lively festivals, magnificent colourful forests and a deep blue sky are just as much a part of the Zillertal Alpine Autumn as the first frost and the already white summits of the numerous threethousand-metre peaks announcing the coming winter.






CELEBRATIONS

With sociable celebrations, traditional music and dance events as well as culinary festivals, we give thanks for a rich harvest and the happy return of the herds from the high alpine pastures.

Watch Zillertal locals at work as they make the famous "Doggln" shoes or produce delicious cheeses. Tip: In the Braukunsthaus you can see how the local Zillertal beer is brewed.

EXPERIENCE

Hiking, biking, climbing or golfing: a variety of outdoor activities are still possible in Zillertal in autumn and you will be rewarded with a fairy-tale natural backdrop. Tip: Snow fans can already find fantastic conditions on the Hintertux Glacier to make their first tracks in the snow at an altitude of 3,250 m.

DISCOVER

The weather doesn't play ball? Thereis also plenty to do indoor in Zillertal. Kabooom, the Playarena and the AlbertAdler PlayWorld are just a few. Look forward to games, fun and action with bouldering, the Airparc, tennis, squash, bowling and much more. New: the Visorium in Mayrhofen with laser tag, escape rooms and adventure golf.



When the farmers drive the animals from the mountain pastures down to the valley in autumn, it's just the right time to celebrate sociable festivals and usher in the golden season.

CLIMBINPARK

The climbINpark children's and family festival in Fügen's Schlosspark offers a colourful programme: supervised children's climbing, a bouncy castle, bungee trampoline, mini golf, football darts, XXL game box, children's face painting, pony rides as well as a shooting gallery and live music.

Local farmers and family-run farms from all over the valley present their products to take with you or sample on the spot at the Zillertal farmers' markets in Fügen, Zell, Gerlos and Mayrhofen.



The Zillertal Krampus parades take you on an emotional journey into another world.

Ancient customs and modern creativity come together here. Creating a living example of preserved and reinterpreted tradition.

hen the cold November air fills Zillertal's valleys, small and big hearts start to beat faster. Amid the darkness and freezing cold, the Krampus figures are on the prowl. Saint Nicholas' sinister companions spread fear and fascination in equal measure with their eerie masks and wild costumes.

Krampus – also known as the "Toifl" (devil) in Zillertal – had the job of frightening and punishing naughty children. The earliest mention of this custom is from the 16th century, and its present form dates back to "Stubenspiele" – plays performed in homes. In some places, this tradition gave rise to what are now known as Krampus runs. The Krampus figures parade through the villages in large groups, called a "Pass" or "Passen". These Passen are dressed in furry garments and wear scary masks.

We enjoy local Krampus show runs as a great spectacle that captivates us. Their special feature lies not only in the centuries-old tradition, but also in the diversity and creativity of the participating clubs. Over time, the various spontaneous gatherings and groupings evolved club structures, and today there are ten active groups in Zillertal. The oldest "Toifl" clubs are the "Bruggera Toifl" and "Teufelpass Uderns", both founded in 2000.



Each group has its own unique character. They start to gather ideas early in the new year. The content, programmes, music and events are meticulously planned. This planning is one thing, but the rehearsals, accuracy and passion for perfectionism are quite something else. Fire breathing, the stirring of witches' cauldrons and many other aspects are individually rehearsed and memorised for the performances on frosty nights. Each performer lives and breathes their role during this exciting event, because the interaction between the various characters and spectacles is essential to surprise the audience again every year.

CHILDHOOD MEMORIES BROUGHT BACK TO LIFE

This time at the end of the year unites spectators and performers once again. Rattling chains and ringing bells create a terrifying soundscape and get pulses racing. A mood of curiosity and excitement descends among the people amid the aromas of hot drinks and delicious treats. Children press nervously up against their parents, their eyes wide open with wonder and perhaps a little fear. The adults remember their own childhood, when they stood on the side of the road themselves and gazed in awe at the "Toifl" with their creepy masks.

The fire creates an atmosphere of horror and awe that intensifies the experience.










The art of carving involved in these masks not only requires craftsmanship, but also a deep understanding of culture and customs.

AMID FURS, HORNS AND WOOD

Christian Eberharter from Zillertal is one of the few who can still call themselves masters the art of mask

making. The tradition of carving has a long history in his family. Intrigued, he started watching his grandfather at work 30 years ago. Christian originally carved cows and sheep before discovering his passion for Krampus masks. For him, his profession is not just a source

of joy and fulfilment, but also a skill that is highly valued by the community. If often takes several weeks to produce each individual mask. The design of the mask varies, but there are certain features that characterise the Krampus: large, curved horns and distorted,

grotesque facial features. Carving itself requires years of experience and a steady hand. First, the rough contours of the mask are carved out of the pine wood using

a chisel and hammer, and then details such as the eyebrows, wrinkles and teeth are carefully defined using various tools. This step is particularly difficult, since every movement of the carving knife can change the expression of the mask. Once carved, the

mask is painted to create an even more terrifying appearance and give the face a demonic effect. Each mask is unique and is often used or passed on from one generation to the next.

THE MASK SLIPS

At the end of the evening, when the "Toifl" take off their masks and scary costumes, the true figure emerges. Familiar faces with sootsmeared cheeks and eyes shining with pride appear from under the hairy garments still storing the heat from all the physical activity.

A broad grin, filled with relief and honour, conveys the deep attachment to this custom that each and every one of the group of "Toifl" feels. The anticipation of the next Krampus season starts flowing through our veins as soon as the last torch is extinguished.



LEGENDARY FLINTSTONE OF THE ALPS

THE GARNET

It is famous for its deep red colour and mysterious transparency, but its draw extends far beyond its physical beauty.

Numerous hiking trails and exhibitions in Zillertal are dedicated to the history and geology of this very special gem.





MAGNIFICENT

The Granatkapelle chapel impresses with its modern architecture in the shape of a garnet and its inspiring location on the Penkenjoch. A place of silence, contemplation, devotion and gratitude that is open to everyone — regardless of their denomination. The interior of the chapel is decorated with a mosaic of five local woods.









SPARKLING

The "Hidden Treasures" exhibition in the Nature Park House in Ginzling extends over two floors and covers an area of more than 500 m². Visitors can expect a unique journey through the geological history of the Zillertal Alps — and sparkling crystal treasures that were created over millions of years inside the mountains.

RADIANT


The deep red precious mineral is highly valued by jewellery designers and has always been an important part of traditional Zillertal jewellery. The garnet is not only a beautiful eye-catcher, but also a cultural symbol that expresses a deep affinity with tradition and the regional heritage.

SWEET

Soft almond nougat that melts on your tongue combined with black-currant marzipan: the Zillertal Garnet – also known as the Zillertal Mozartkugel – is a souvenir that you must try. The praline has been produced in the traditional Kostner cafe in Mayrhofen for over 21 years. In winter it is even available online.







Combining the features you need on uphill stretches with protection for tackling the descent, this GORE-TEX ski shell is at home anywhere on the mountain.



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
